How do we build more specific knowledge?

- Special elective course: Primary Care Psychology
- Introduction to integrated care models
- Training in brief assessment & intervention (PCBH)

The interprofessional classroom

How do we promote collaborative learning early in graduate training?

- Invite graduate students from health disciplines across the university to participate in interprofessional training series
- 3 synchronous Zoom trainings on IP Competencies
 - Mutual respect/common values, defining roles, communication skills, working as team
- 1 in person simulated patient experience

Practicum Experiences

How can we collaborate with community organizations to build and sustain applied learning experiences?

- FDU ENGAGED Educating the Next Generation to Advance Growth through Empowerment and Diversity
- Collaboration with social work, nurse practitioner, and school psychology to implement interdisciplinary education and development along with support to graduate students and professionals providing behavioral health services to youth in medically underserved communities.
- Provide stipends for practicum placements in the community, including FQHCs and school system
- Interprofessional training experiences
